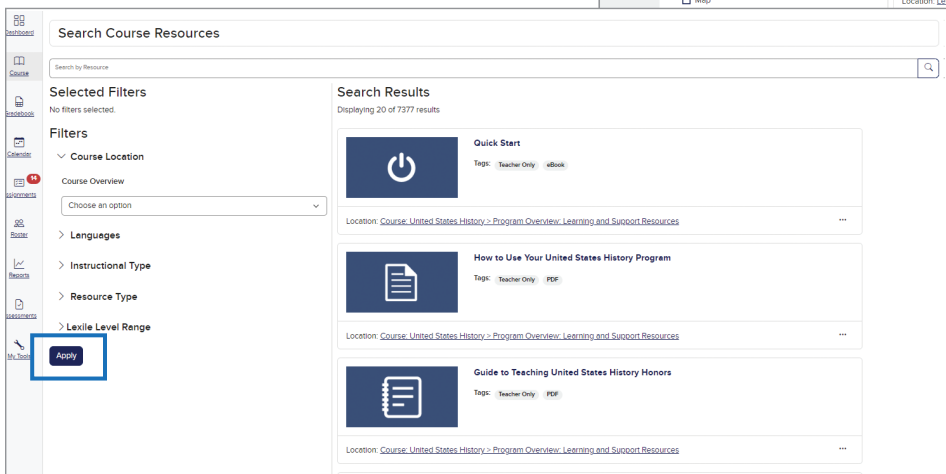
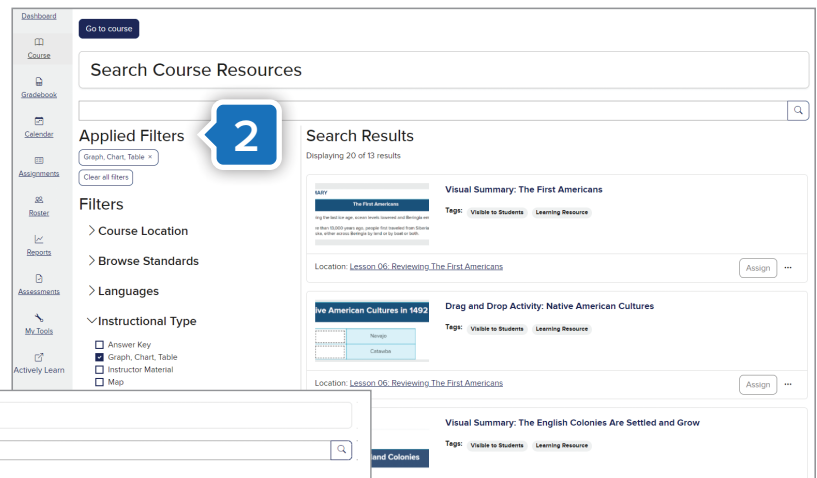
# Locating Resources

2. On the resource page, you will see a wide range of options to refine your search, including Course Location, Instructional Type, and Resource Type, with more filters within.

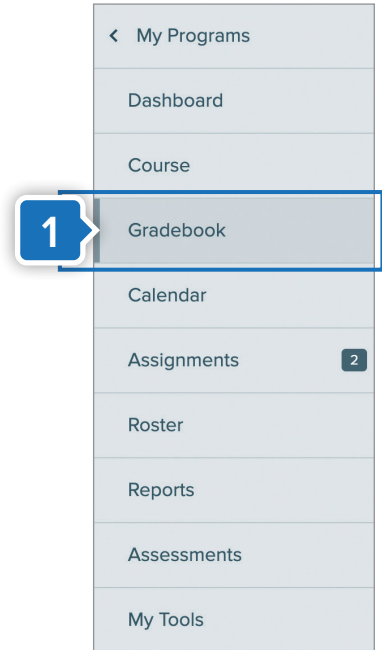


# Gradebook

# Assessments

From the dashboard, click on the **Interactive Student eBook with Reading Levels** tile to go right to the current topic and lesson.

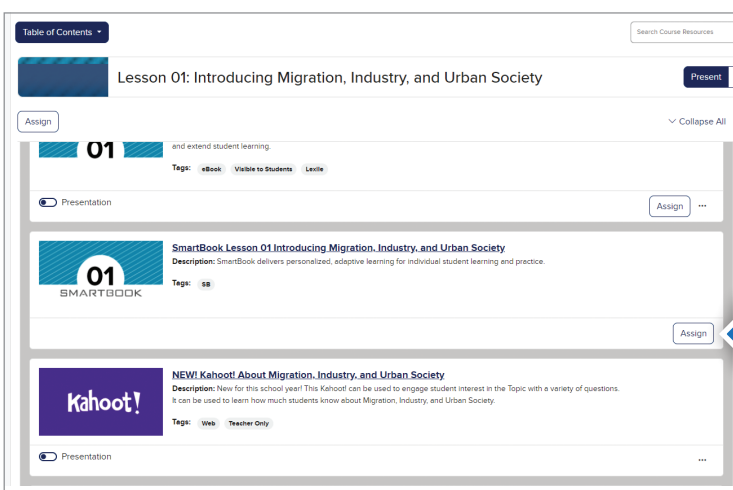
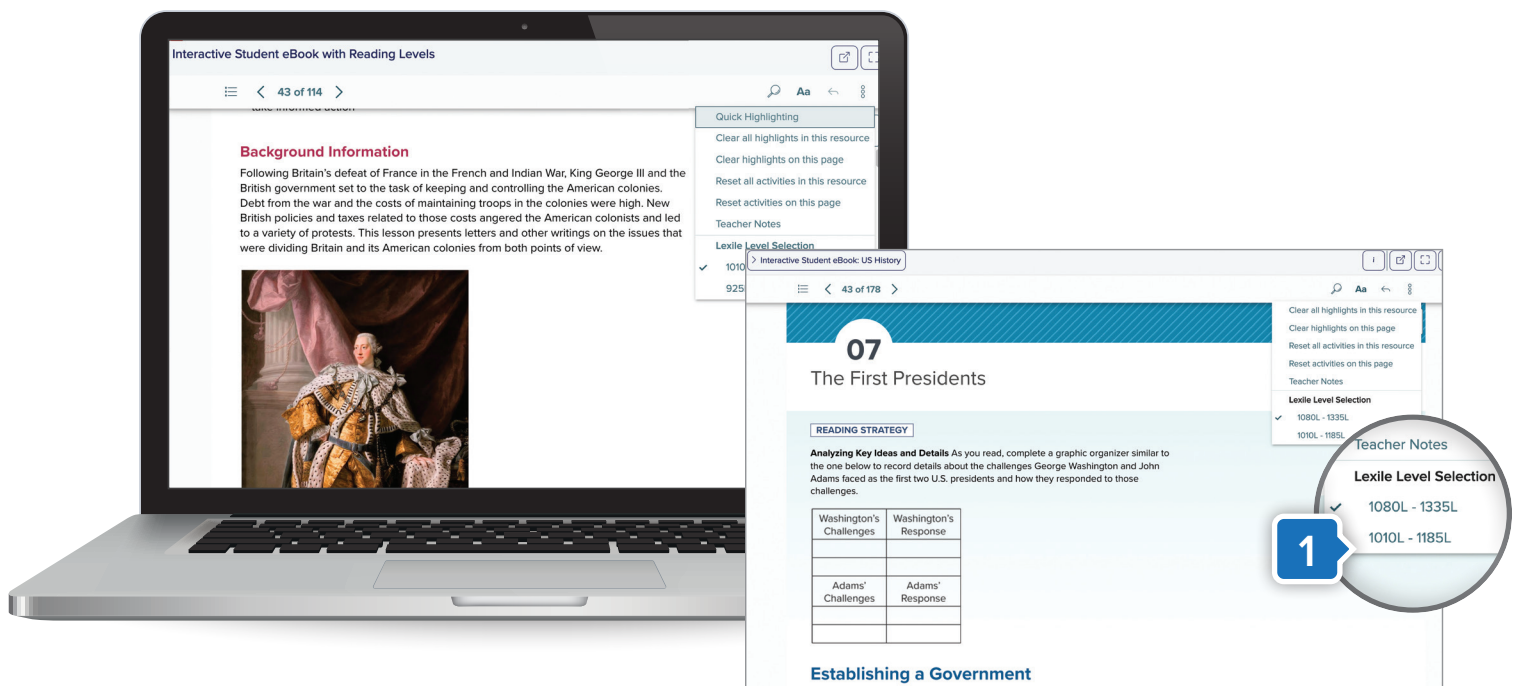
1. Use the Table of Contents to easily navigate to a topic, chapter, or lesson.

# Customize Learning and Instruction

The Interactive Student eBook is the primary digital tool students will use to learn from and engage with the program. It features interactive questions and comes in both On-Level and Approaching-Level versions.

1. You can assign an Approaching-Level Interactive Student eBook, which provides the core narrative at **two grade levels lower**. After you set the student's reading level, the system automatically displays the eBook content and all assignments at the selected level to the student. Only teachers can see the selected Lexile Level for each individual student.
2. You can **assign** a topic or lesson in the eBook to your students. Students can answer directly in the eBook and submit the assignment for review and grading.



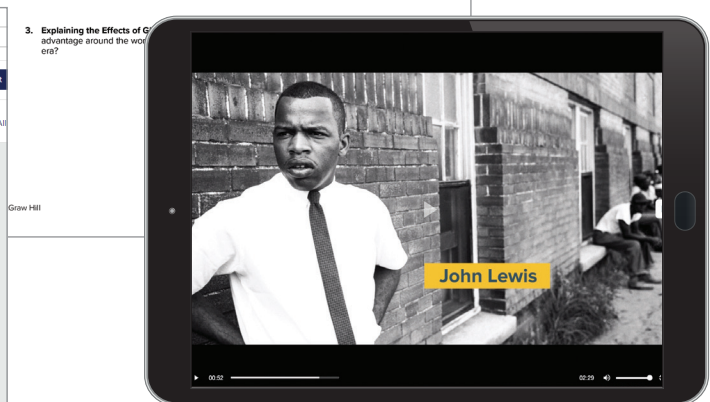
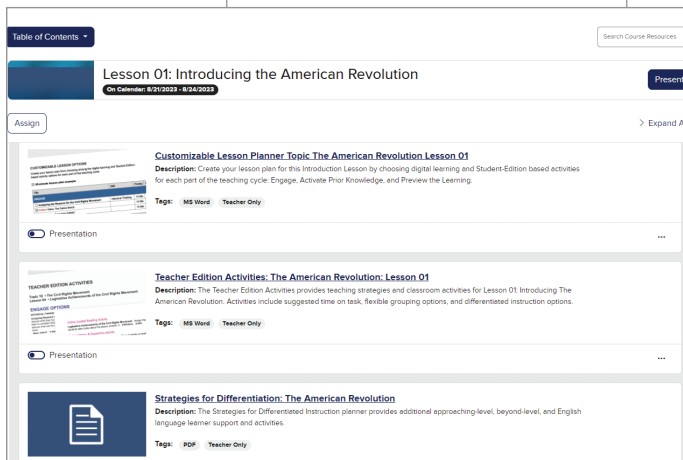
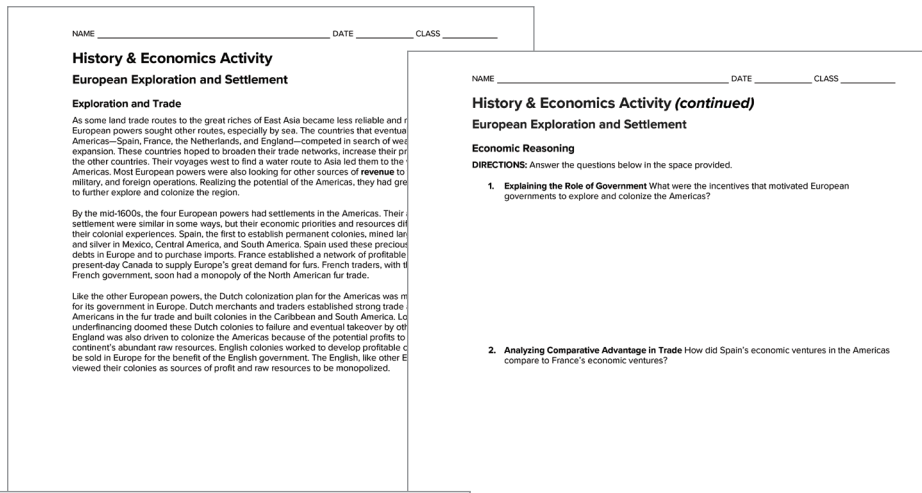

# Personalize Learning for Every Student

Built for adaptive, personalized learning, *SmartBook*® empowers students to focus on key concepts and achieve understanding and mastery through practice and study.

1. Access *SmartBook* by clicking on **Assignments**, then click **New Assignment** on the next screen.

**Understanding the Time and Place: The United States, 1865–1954**

The civil rights reform movement of the 1950s and 1960s was a response to a long history of racial inequality in the United States. During the Reconstruction period after the Civil War (from about 1865 to 1877) Constitutional amendments gave African Americans the rights of citizenship. However, in the years following 1877, state governments denied African Americans their rights and legalized segregation and discrimination across the United States. The civil rights movement formed to protest this inequality and aimed to overturn this systemic discrimination.

**Reconstruction, 1865–1877**

After the Civil War, the Constitution was revised to protect the rights of African Americans through three important amendments. The Thirteenth Amendment legally ended slavery throughout the United States. The Fourteenth Amendment granted citizenship to African Americans and provided legal protections. The Fifteenth
